## WHY DECENT WAGES MATTER

The rising cost of living has many of us understandably worried. Good wages matter to local families.

In April, local councillors Valerie Kenny & Chris Cornell called on Canterbury City Council to join more than 2,800 employers in becoming an accredited Living Wage Employer.

The council already pay the Living Wage to most of its staff, but have recently taken measures to ensure they don't have to extend this offer to street sweepers and bin men.

As an accredited Living Wage Employer, the council would have to pay the Living Wage and set out a plan to encourage other local businesses in its supply chain to do the same. The Conservative Cabinet rejected this move out of hand..

Shernaz, who runs a shop in Harbour St, has paid the Living Wage for over ten years. She said, "it is shameful that this council won't stand up and provide a bit of moral leadership when people are struggling."

# WELCOMING OUR NEW UKRAINIAN FRIENDS

When the first bombs fell on Kviv many of us watched on helplessly. Yet less than ten days later more than 120 people gathered at St Peter's Church for a meeting called by Cllr Chris Cornell and Rev. Rachel Webbley to work out how we, as a community, could help.

The Whitstable Welcome Network was formed that evening and has since provided support to over 50 local families who have opened their doors to over 100 displaced people.

Working with Whitstable Rotary, the Network has raised over £15,000 to buy bus passes, school uniforms and generally support the Ukralnian community here while they are waiting to claim benefits.

"We just had to do something", said Chris. "There was so much goodwill that night that just needed a little direction."

The Network started online as a resource bank to help people with the visa application process. As people began to arrive it ran weekly welcome sessions with staff from Rosie Duffield's office. Wednesday mornings at the Umbrella Centre soon became a place where people got advice on how to register for benefits, get their children into schools and access local services.

Nicola May, who led the Welcome Team, said: "We helped arrange free football training for kids, art classes for the elderly, bikes to help get people to school and dozens of jobs in local businesses. In the last few months some of our guests have returned home but many continue to live among us - not as refugees but as friends."



### **MAKING A MARK**

This Easter, Canterbury City Council invested more than £20,000 in a project designed to tackle graffiti across Whitstable. The project was proposed by local Labour councillors back in 2021 following emails from residents.

In the Gorrell Tank car park the pumping station has been cleaned and fixings used by graffiti artists to climb on to the roof removed. The windows here and at the Angling Club on Harbour Street have been covered in such a way that they can be easily cleaned of paint.

# HELPING OUR HIGH STREET AFTER COVID

A host of great ideas suggested by local traders and Labour councillors have been taken up by Canterbury Council as part of government's Welcome Back Fund designed to help support the high street recover from lockdown.

Although other areas in the district struggled to spend their allocation, Whitstable obtained additional funds because of Labour's clear plan.

Local residents and shop keepers donated more than £10,000 for Christmas lights. The council provided brackets and plugs along the high street. The new lights are owned by the town and will go up every year to ensure Whitstable sparkles.

"Working with local traders", Cllr Kenny said, "we have managed to create a sustainable solution to a long running problem and we are working to have lights in the Harbour this year."

Labour councillors have secured funds for large community noticeboards which are being used by local venues to advertise special events. Also funded were electrical supplies to key sites

to help with sound projection for the Remembrance Day parade and also new cycle racks at St Alphege Church, the South Quay Shed and Whitstable Umbrella Centre (who have also added a cycle repair station).

This summer your councillors organised bunting and a large "Welcome to Whitstable" sign. This autumn they are working to launch "Fiver Fest" in town.

"Over 100 Local traders will simultaneously offer five pound deals between the 8th and 22nd of October" explained Cllr Cornell. "Local people can show their support for independant businesses and grab a bargain in the process".

## **ALL CHANGE AT THE BELMONT**

Whitstable Town Football Club has invested almost £300,000 to replace its existing pitch with hardier artificial pitch. The new pitch will meet the growing ambitions of the club. Despite a strong business plan and obvious community benefit, the Conservative-led Canterbury City Council shamefully refused provide any financial help. Other clubs in the league have been helped by their local council. Labour councillors have contributed to the shortfall in funding.

This March, Cllr Chris Cornell raised the issue of investment in sports fields in a council meeting, highlighting flaws in the council's thinking. The council believe that there are a little over 20 football teams across our town needing space. Whitstable Town FC has over 26 teams across all age ranges. These council's figures don't include the teams at Rising Stars, Tankerton Football Club and many amateur teams.

"It's ridiculous that kids in our community often travel to Herne Bay to train" said Chris Cornell.

"This council is just sticking its head in the sand and hoping no one will notice."
